
A Dream Comes True

The Reality Behind the Fantasy

The village of Laffalot is a fantasy place. But for the children who come to MeritCare Children's, life might not always be a fairy tale.

Each year, hundreds of children from North Dakota, South Dakota and Minnesota come to MeritCare Children's. Some are battling serious and complex conditions like cancer and congenital heart disease, others struggle with more common illnesses such as diabetes and asthma, and still others need regular trips to the clinic for preventive care.

MeritCare Children's Hospital, located on the 4th floor of MeritCare Medical Center in downtown Fargo, N.D., includes a Pediatric Unit, a Pediatric Intensive Care Unit and a Neonatal Intensive Care Unit. Designated a children's hospital by the National Association of Children's Hospitals and Related Institutions in 1986, MeritCare Children's Hospital is the only facility of its kind in the region and one of only 180 premier children's hospitals in the nation.

We also have two dedicated children's clinics in Fargo for outpatient care which are separate from the hospital but part of our overall system of children's care.

Our staff consists of about 50 pediatricians and pediatric specialists — including pediatric critical care and neonatology, specialties rarely found anywhere else in North Dakota or northwestern Minnesota. MeritCare Children's also includes more than 200 pediatric nurses, therapists and other staff.

These highly qualified medical experts practice in a number of important areas that allow children to be cared for right here in Fargo without having to travel long distances.

nce upon a time...

Alexis and Anna Elfstrum, Fargo, sisters with more than two years between them, were both born with the same life-threatening medical condition.

Alexis was born 12 weeks premature and weighed only two pounds, nine ounces. She had Patent Ductus Arteriosus (PDA), which causes too much blood to flow into her lungs. She spent her first seven weeks in the NICU, and at 18 months returned for corrective surgery. Parents, Kevin and Lora thought they'd seen the last of the MeritCare NICU.

Then Anna was born. Fourteen weeks premature and weighing only two pounds, seven ounces, she also suffered from PDA. Fortunately, it was correctable through medication so surgery wasn't necessary.

"Having a baby in the NICU is very challenging, but our experiences were as wonderful as they could be under such circumstances," said Lora. "We are so grateful to MeritCare Children's Hospital for all they did for our two daughters and all they did for us."

At MeritCare Children's, we go beyond exceptional medical care to focus on children's special needs, both physical and emotional. We provide

- Distraction therapy, medical play and other coping mechanisms such as pet therapy



A Place That Can Be Fun

Alfunz and the village of Laffalot are the creations of artist Hans Gilsdorf. The scenes on the pages of this book will give you a glimpse into this magical place. Hans had a dream to create a space for ill children that would make potentially frightening hospitalizations a little easier and more child-friendly. His dream connected with ours, and Laffalot became a reality.

Laffalot is a Renaissance-era village of crisp colors, friendly faces and tantalizing textures. The first thing children see upon entering is a giant, three dimensional mural of the village sculpted and painted into the front lobby wall. Alfunz is there to greet them. Up and down the hallways street pole signs provide directions to different patient areas. Each room is a private "cottage," with a roof overhanging the door. Even the signal lights for nurses look like old-fashioned lanterns.

Kids can leave messages for Alfunz about their feelings, frustrations or anything else in his mailbox in the lobby. Volunteers respond as Alfunz, returning messages to mailboxes built into the walls next to each cottage door.

All the murals and amenities are designed to create a unique setting that promotes a healing atmosphere, and educational value is infused into as many elements as possible. The halls of MeritCare Children's extend the village theme throughout the facility where it's appropriate.

Gretchen Finseth, Thief River Falls, had a breathing problem so serious she nearly died.

Her parents, Melissa and Larry, knew something was wrong as soon as she was born. After conventional treatments failed, Gretchen was transported to MeritCare Children's Hosptal NICU, where doctors found the airways to her lungs were constricted.

A MeritCare pediatric cardiologist approached Melissa and Larry about an experimental nitric oxide treatment that might save their daughter's life. The treatment, available as part of a National Institutes of Health study involving only the top NICUs in the country, improves the flow of oxygen to an infant's tiny lungs. Gretchen's condition improved dramatically, and within two weeks, she was breathing on her own.

"To know such a high level of care for children is available in our region is wonderful," says Melissa. "Every day, we thank God she is with us."

The Bell triplets, Wahpeton, were born eight weeks early. Brianna weighed only three pounds, nine ounces; Carlie, three pounds, eight ounces; and Alexis, the tiniest, only three pounds, three-and-a-half ounces. They were immediately transferred to MeritCare Children's Hospital NICU, where Alexis was placed

But something else was wrong. A pediatric specialist determined two of the girls had alloimmune neutropenia, a rare blood disorder characterized by abnormally low levels of white blood cells that defend our bodies against bacterial infections. He immediately put the triplets on medication to stimulate white blood cell production.

During their five-week stay in the NICU, parents, Sherry and Graydon, spent every possible minute at MeritCare, worrying about their daughters but also making friends they will hold forever close to their hearts. "We left with tears in our eyes and hugs at the door from the people who took such good care of our beautiful little girls," Sherry says.


Today, Alexis, Brianna and Carlie are healthy, active little girls learning all about how fun life can be as a triplet.

They're All Part of Our Family

Pediatric Unit

The MeritCare Children's Hospital general Pediatric Unit has 22 private rooms. Prior to the renovation, children often shared rooms. The rooms are designed to stimulate play and create a feeling of comfort, featuring amenities such as a PlayStation II, television, DVD/CD player and a computer available for games, internet access and e-mail. The rooms are also family-friendly, providing special couches or chairs that fold out into beds and allow moms and dads to sleep at their child's side. And that's important; studies show that sick children who are surrounded by their families in more personal environments recover more quickly. Each private room also has a bathroom and a shower.

Inside the Pediatric Unit are five rooms specifically designed for children with cancer. They have specialized air-handling and ventilation systems to help children with the most suppressed immune systems, providing specially-filtered air that prevents the spread



Special Care for Those Who are Most Sick

Pediatric Intensive Care Unit (PICU)

The MeritCare Children's Hospital PICU is next to the general Pediatric Unit and is designed specifically for children with the most critical injuries or illnesses. The staff is specially trained to care for very sick children ranging in age from a few months to 17 years.


As part of the renovation, we changed the PICU from an open ward to six private rooms and two isolation rooms with reverse airflow. The new individual rooms allow children and their families to be closer and more comfortable, but more importantly, they provide proven healing benefits.

For example, they lessen over-stimulation from the noise associated with the open ward, allowing our sickest children to rest more peacefully. Parents can also stay at the bedside 24/7.









Returning to the Village

Children's Clinics

MeritCare Children's encompasses several areas designed and staffed just for kids' outpatient clinic visits. Specialty clinics serve children with multiple medical needs. They can see several different providers in one day rather than having several appointments in numerous locations.

Our two children's clinics in Fargo are special places just for outpatient visits. Like the Children's Hospital, the clinics feature the look and feel of Laffalot to lessen the anxiety that a child might experience, and members of the staff specialize in caring for children.

Children's Walk-In Clinic

For busy parents and kids who get sick outside of regular office hours, we offer walk-in care with no appointments necessary. MeritCare Children's Southwest Walk-In Clinic is open extended hours, seven days a week.





Twenty-month-old Simon Nelson, Hitterdal, nearly froze to death.

It was a bitterly cold, 10-degree night in 2001 when Simon wandered from his home wearing only pajamas. His dad, Brian, found him at 4:30 a.m. lying in the snow about 100 yards from the house, seemingly lifeless. When emergency crews arrived, Simon did not have a pulse.

Simon was flown to Children's Hospital by MeritCare LifeFlight helicopter. When he arrived, his body temperature was only 69 degrees. To warm him, doctors opened his chest and hooked him up to a pediatric heart-lung machine, one of the only child-sized machines in North Dakota.

Two weeks after nearly freezing to death, Simon toddled out of MeritCare surrounded by smiling family, friends and staff. "It's a miracle he's alive today," says Brian. More than just alive, today Simon is a healthy, active young man.


Children's Fundraising Campaign


...Happily Ever After.
